"Look Them in the Eyes and Say Hello"

I am here to explore and celebrate how learning a new language deepens and enriches cultural connection.

Firstly, let's acknowledge technology's role in facilitating quick, often accurate, translation going from screen to screen. But quick translation is only one part of what we teach in our language classes. We, language teachers, go much deeper than communicating through screens. We use teaching language and culture to help our students connect on a human to human, face to face, level. We want our students to use language and culture to build relationships.

In today's keynote, we will discuss how teaching and learning new languages encourages connection. We want our students to do more than look at a screen to communicate, we want our students to have the confidence to look someone new in the eye and say hello.

Harnessing AI for Process Writing in EFL/ESL Classrooms: Insights and Implementation Strategies

This workshop aims to bridge the gap between traditional writing instruction and the evolving landscape of Al-assisted composition. The presenter will discuss key findings from his recent studies exploring the ethical integration of Al tools (specifically ChatGPT and Perplexity) in teaching process writing to EFL students. Many of these insights can be effectively adapted for ESL writing classrooms and offer practical strategies for educators.

Our session will cover the following topics:

- 1. Comparison of ChatGPT and Perplexity
- 2. Collaborative development of Al guidelines for your class
- 3. Techniques for teaching prompt engineering
- 4. Implementing a step-by-step process-oriented approach to writing using AI tools
- 5. Al feedback as a model for peer review

Participants will gain insights into how to equip students with the skills to harness AI ethically and effectively in their writing processes, both within and beyond the classroom setting.
