Instructions: -Respond to the following statements by writing **Y for "yes"** or **N for "no"** in the left column

- was a leader in high school
- got suspended from school
- was rejected from a college I wanted to attend
- have grandparents that were born outside of the United States

- take medication on a daily basis for health reasons
- have broken someone's heart
- have caught myself judging someone before I even met them
- have dated someone outside of my race
- have raised-grown-killed food for my consumption
- has a friend or family member who has been sexually assaulted or raped
- have experienced privileges that people of other races don't
- have been followed around a store when I shopped
- have been the target of a racist comment
- abandoned my faith at some point in my life
- know the meaning of an upside down pink triangle
- have had someone close to me die
- love someone who has been or is in jail
- have danced/entered a gay bar
